	Have at least two exits from the home, and a safe meeting place. Practice the escape plan so everyone knows what to do if there is a fire.		
	Make sure you can get to children, babies and/or people who may need assistance		
	Discuss and decide who will help others that may need assistance.		
	Teach everyone in your home, including children how to dial 111 in an emergency and how to say your address.		
	Run annual fire drills and familiarise children with smoke alarm sounds.		
	Make a list of key emergency contacts.		
	Check your insurance policies, so you know you have the right level of cover. Ask questions if something is unclear.		
	Take photos or videos of your contents and their model number/serial number regularly - save it in a cloud account (your phone might be lost in the event!).		
	Check your contents cover through the FMG home contents calculator online fmg.co.nz

	Install photoelectric smoke alarms in every bedroom, living room and hallway.		
	Have a fire extinguisher in the kitchen and garage - they should be mounted to the wall. Check them annually.		
	Remove obstacles from escape routes. Check that doors and windows are unlocked from the inside or that keys are easy to locate		
	for your escape routes.		G*61*G
	Ensure fire appliances can access your home by having 4mx4m clearance from the property entrance to the house.
